Combining live action and computer animation, *The Busy Little Engine* tells the story of a toy wooden train that pretends to be real (his CGI alter-ego is superimposed onto actual train tracks), embarking on an imaginative journey to gather the necessary materials for a factory to make cookies, and accompanied by his question-asking puppet friend Pig. Along the way, young viewers will visit a farm and meet animals, learn about different train cars, and hear three infectiously fun original songs by Jimmy Magoo. DVD extras include a sing-along

version of each song and a simple "makingof" featurette geared toward young children. Given the preschool crowd's perennial interest in trains, this fun and educational program is highly recommended. Aud: K, P. (R. Reagan)

Three other tales are also featured on this disc: "The Lovers" (about talking toys and their romantic misfires). "The Old Street Lamp" (chronicling an enchanted last night of work for an outdated talking oil lamp), and "The Bottleneck" (following the "life" of a talking champagne bottle that eventually winds up as a bird's drinking cup). The highlight of the program is actually the opening credits, which feature a live-action storyteller/babysitter and his captivated charges as they morph into cartoons and follow along with the tales. The Avatar of the title is Aang, a 12-yearold reincarnation of an ancient being whose purpose, in the imagined world of this often beautiful anime-style Nickelodeon-aired series, is to restore harmony between the four elements: fire, earth, air, and water. At various times in history, the Avatar has been embodied in different masters of each of those elements, and Aang, freed from a century-long sleep within an iceberg, is an "airbender," capable of using air and wind as forces for moving objects and defeating armies of firebending bad guys. While there's plenty of action here, the greater dramatic interest lies in Aang's reintroduction to the world he left behind 100 years before. Featuring the suitable for 7-up-opening volume in the series also includes a behind-the-scenes "kung fu" featurette. Highly recommended. Aud: P. (T. Keogh)

40 Greatest Kid Concoctions features an excellent array of activities designed for children of all ages (including this twentysomething reviewer and her husband). Backed by a bright and colorful set, John and Danita Thomas—Parents Choice award-winning parents of four, and co-authors of the Kid Concoctions book series—walk viewers through 40 mostly-awesome projects (all prefaced with a text list of ingredients/materials and instructions; also included in an accompanying booklet).

The projects involve recycling (such as using coffee grounds in a recipe to make a "Treasure Stone" to hide party goodies in), snacks (super easy "Shake & Make" ice cream and slushies), music (the "Tropical Rain Stick"), paleontology ("Fantasy Fossils"), party favors ("Fruity Lip Gloss"—or balm for boys—made with powdered drink mix), variations on classics (such as "Funny Putty" that still picks up newsprint), and just flat-out weird stuff (including "Dryer Lint Clay" and preservative-free "Dog & Cat Treats"). An ideal answer to rainy day tedium (and most definitely preferable to the "go clean out your closet" option), this is highly recommended. Editor's Choice. Aud: P. (J. Williams-Wood)
